2014 – The Grassey Cay Group Home opens near the Beaches where there is a shortage of respite services for families in that area. 5 young men reside there on a permanent basis with one respite bed.



2013 – A new building was purchased to accommodate the Career Development Center, ADT Program and Supported Employment. Funds are being raised to expand service capacity.



2007 – Arts-based Adult Day Training (ADT) program begins with just 2 persons at Riverside Presbyterian Church Mission building. In one year, the program experiences rapid growth and moves to Lakewood United Methodist Church to accommodate requests for participation.

2017 – Angelwood serves over 350 area families who have loved ones living with developmental disabilities such as Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Down syndrome, Spina Bifida and Intellectual Disabilities.



1993 – Inspired by the needs for her daughters, Angelwood is founded by Sally Fox. Work on the Cheatham Trail Group Home began. 5 children served annually. The Sidesaddle group home opened shortly there after in 1994.

2001 – The Scott Mill home opened for 6 children. Angelwood served a total of 13 children living in our group homes, with 3 respite spaces available.



2002 – Angelwood Summer Day Camp opens serving 36 children each week. The Scott Mill home opened for 6 children and began serving a total of 13 children living in our group homes, with 3 respite spaces available. The Macaw Group home opened for 5 teenage boys, with an additional respite bed.



2004 – Angelwood Administrative Offices move to "The Farm" on Hood Road. Due to budget cuts only 1 Respite Space is able to be maintained in Group Homes. Olson Lane group home is purchased and renovated. Opening in early 2005, this home was opened for 6 young people requiring nursing services.

2005 – Parents' Night Out program is launched. This program provides a needed evening out for parents while all the children in the family have fun in a safe environment.

What's in a name?

For several years there has been a broad movement to take the "R" word out of even our thought process when referring to people

who live with intellectual and developmental disabilities. While the word originated as descriptive, it meant they learned slower than others, today that word has a meaning that is demoralizing. It has evolved into a hurtful slur that has been used to make fun of someone. We have all heard it and at the least cringed and admittedly sometimes boil.

Over the years, the way we refer to the people we serve has changed multiple times. Overall, the question I ask is: What is most respectful? I have concluded this: The people we serve at Angelwood live with developmental disabilities. They often have many struggles as they navigate the world; caring for their personal needs, getting jobs, sometimes learning basic life skills.

Yet, the part that makes us alike is stronger than any of our differences. The people we serve appreciate beauty, they love and are loved, they have emotions so may cry when sad, laugh when happy and exalt with pride when a job is well done.

Sometimes what we call people reflects how we believe they should be treated – I think we best describe the people we serve by calling them - people.
